

From the President's Office

The annual "Doors Open" day held by Glasgow City Council was on 15 September. The College has always been one of the most popular venues, and this year some 784 people streamed through the doors of 232-242 St Vincent Street. The feedback from our guests was, as usual, extremely positive. Our art collection, archives and the magnificent College interior caused gasps of amazement and real appreciation of this jewel in the crown of the City.

On 29 August, we launched the corporate hospitality trading company of College, called Fifteen Ninety Nine (in recognition of the year of our founding). We hope to attract additional business which will be to the financial advantage of College coffers. Fifteen Ninety Nine will also be a membership benefit with attractive discounts to Fellows and Members in good standing. On the evening of the launch, potential corporate clients were introduced to our venue and the catering delights provided by our new Catering Manager, Mr Richie Holmes and his staff. The shrill of bagpipes, courtesy of the Royal Regiment of Scotland, added to the occasion. Fifteen Ninety Nine will never be allowed to detract from the true purpose of College, that is, to serve the best interests of Fellows and Members, which will always remain paramount.

Our ambitious IT programme nears completion with only slight slippage in our time schedule, but on budget and on specification. This is quite a comparison to events in the NHS and by all accounts many other healthcare organisations worldwide, who have thrown in the towel in the hallowed quest of being in full control of their IT, being paperless and yet still retaining sanity and purpose.

In May, Mr John Cooper and I visited colleagues in India and we were hugely appreciative of the warm reception from many Fellows and colleagues. Dr Jagadeesan, one of our Senior Fellows and based in Chennai, assembled a large number of high profile guests at a lunch reception in his residence and there followed a full and frank discussion of the current and future role of College in India. Dr Jagadeesan proved to be a consummate host, as well as Chairman of the meeting.

As many of you know, he has been a long standing loyal friend of the College over many, many years. On 29 October, I was delighted to lay a foundation stone on the site of a future office for the College within a building in Delhi, made possible by the kindness and generosity of the International Medical Sciences Academy of which Dr Jagadeesan is President.

I was left with the clear impression of mutual respect between College and our friends and colleagues in India. There is no doubt that we have an enormous amount to learn from our Indian colleagues, especially given the vast and varied clinical workload which they face on a daily basis with a determination and ability which would overwhelm us in the West. India is a land of limitless potential and an assured future of global pre-eminence. I was awe-struck by my visit.

The new Faculty of Podiatric Medicine held its inauguration on the 10 October and Founding Fellows were introduced to the College. This is the second Faculty of multi-disciplinary professionals to join the College and, along with the Faculty of Travel Medicine, will have considerable potential to expand both within the UK and internationally.

As a result of recent Cabinet reshuffles, both in the Scottish Government in Holyrood and in the UK Government in Westminster, two new Health Ministers have taken up post. The one in London raised eyebrows as the expectation was rife that he was for the sack. A good performance by Team GB in the Olympics must have extended his UK Cabinet life expectancy but the Health portfolio must be the last envelope left on the desk that any politician would care to pick up.

Mr Hunt is now in charge of a ticking time-bomb in the shape of the Health and Social Care Act left by his predecessor.

Ms Nicola Sturgeon, our former Health Minister in Scotland has had a good tenure in post in that she survived without crisis or scandal. To be fair, she always made herself available to College and listened to our views and advice although, in the end, always made her own decisions, some of which didn't meet with our approval. I will miss working with her: she is clearly on a mission to ascend the political greasy pole to the summit. She is replaced by Mr Alex Neil, a seasoned political big-hitter. I wish my successor well in his dealings with the new Health Secretary who I understand is a resident of Ayr which, according to Robert Burns, is a town of "honest men and bonnie lasses" and where I happened to be schooled.

This is my last College News. I will miss the opportunity to inform, stimulate and, if not, hopefully entertain Fellows and Members with the regular publication. The editors are a skilled bunch of ladies and gentlemen but they brook no dissent and rarely give concessions on tight deadlines. It is one of the few disciplines that I will be able to live without come the AGM. I hope you enjoy reading this edition and its pages of College News and information. I have spared readers from my more formal goodbyes which will be in the Annual Review.

Ian Anderson demits office as President on 7 December 2012 after a long and distinguished career as a Fellow, Councillor, Treasurer and President of our College. His clinical career has been equally long and distinguished. He was a driving force in the introduction of the ATLS course into the UK, he made a huge personal contribution to Emergency Medicine in Glasgow and he was also the first President of the then newly formed College of Emergency Medicine.

Direct, robust and outspoken are three words that describe lan's approach to life. He has called a spade a shovel on many occasions in his clinical life in order to achieve his goals and people have always known precisely where they stood with him. But he also has an abundance of humanity and a strong sense of humour that pervades his whole approach. He has a huge depth of clinical expertise and

a deep and abiding compassion for his patients and for the less well off people of Glasgow, many of whom came through his hands in nearly 40 years of practice in Accident and Emergency. It was that desire to give the best to his patients that drove his approach to everything he did clinically and through the College.

His list of achievements for this College is impressive. He was an examiner for many years and as Treasurer he established a strong and resilient investment portfolio that gives the College a robust reserve. As President he has overseen the introduction of a new website and database, the creation of the posts of two additional vice-presidents and the establishment of the Clinical Anatomy Skills Centre with Glasgow University. The new trading company, Fifteen Ninety Nine has been launched and will add to the income stream of the College for many

All of the above are very significant achievements in and of themselves but collectively they have placed the College on a very firm foundation for further development. Medical Training Initiative

College remains actively involved as a sponsor in the General Medical Council's Medical Training Initiative.

A recurring theme in the process has been discussion of how best to support doctors new to the UK through the provision of induction courses, whether provided centrally or on a hospital-by-hospital basis.

Following the GMC's recent consultation on induction, the Academy of Medical Royal Colleges (AoMRC) is organising a Medical Training Initiative Orientation Day, taking place on 22 November 2012 at the Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health.

This day-long event is designed to provide recent MTI doctors with a comprehensive understanding of the NHS

and medical practice in the UK. The day will bring together senior clinicians and representatives from the General Medical Council, British Medical Association, the Medical Deaneries and the Royal Medical Colleges. It will also give doctors on the MTI programme a chance to meet and network with other international doctors.

A number of topics will be covered including:

- NHS and UK postgraduate medical education;
- The professional standards expected of a doctor in the UK;
- · Communication and culture;

- Ethical decision making;
- Hints and tips from a current MTI participant.

The day is primarily aimed at MTI doctors who started their placements after March 2012.

However, MTI doctors who started before this date will also attend, providing an opportunity to meet and welcome new colleagues and to share experiences.

Revalidation Update

The Secretary of State for Health, the Right Honourable Jeremy Hunt MP, announced on 19 October that the new system of appraisal and revalidation for doctors will be introduced in December 2012.

Preparations for revalidation have been ongoing for the past two years and the College has been actively involved in a number of steering and advisory groups to ensure that the interests of Fellows and Members across the United Kingdom have been taken into account.

To ensure that Fellows and Members remain informed, and to respond to any requests for information and clarification on how the new system will work, we have established a dedicated Revalidation Helpdesk to address all enquiries and to support Fellows and Members through the process.


The Helpdesk will respond to all questions in relation to processes and procedures. Enquiries of a clinical / specialty nature will be considered by a Revalidation and Relicensing Board (RRB) comprising of representatives from the range of medical and surgical specialties.

In partnership with the Academy of Medical Royal Colleges (AOMRC), we are currently compiling a list of Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) to assist Fellows and Members understand what revalidation will mean for them.



Thiel Morgue - A Scottish First

Scotland is set to lead the UK in the advancement of medical, surgical and dental training with plans to establish the country's first morgue that exclusively adopts the Thiel method of embalming.

Led by Professor Sue Black OBE, FRSE, FRAI Hon FRCPSG, the Thiel morgue promises to be a centre of excellence that will pave the way for new training techniques, more life-like cadavers, and more national and international collaboration.

Formalin is traditionally used for embalming corpses and whilst they have provided an invaluable tool for enabling understanding of the human body, the body is left dry and stiff which is not an ideal medium for surgical requirements.

Thiel embalming was developed by a German anatomist called Walther Thiel, who died in February 2012. The embalming process involves perfusing the body with a special fluid and then submerging it in the fluid for up to two months. The outcome is a body in which the tissue remains soft and flexible – more life-like.

"Because Thiel bodies more closely resemble and feel like living bodies, they offer enormous potential and exciting opportunities for medical, surgical, dental, and scientific training, study and research," says Professor Black.

Professor Black currently heads the award winning Centre for Anatomy and Human Identification (CAHID) at the University of Dundee and is internationally renowned for her expertise in forensic anthropology. She was awarded an OBE for human identification work on mass graves in Kosovo and developed ground breaking

hand identification techniques which have secured convictions against Scotland's largest paedophile ring.

She believes the new Thiel Centre, which will be an extension of CAHID, will facilitate the development of further new techniques and expertise both in forensics and professional medical, dental and surgical training. In these areas she firmly believes that Scotland can really take a lead in the UK.

The team have already provided advanced mortuary training to the UK national Disaster Victim Identification deployment capability. Every UK police officer deployed to a national or international mass fatality event will have been trained at the Centre, which has also welcomed many international visitors including the FBI.

The Dundee team expect to formally launch the Thiel morgue later this year. It is a first for the UK and will require specialised equipment that will take up a lot of floor space – preparation tanks, storage facilities, lifting equipment, chemical stores and embalming preparation areas all need to be installed.

Development of the Centre is planned to occur in three phases:

Phase 1 will involve the building of the new state-of-the-art Thiel morgue and front of house.

Phase 2 will involve the building of the anatomy teaching rooms, changing areas and laboratories.

Phase 3 will see completion of the forensic laboratories and teaching areas.

The University of Dundee has already invested £1.5 million to build the Centre. A novel campaign to raise a further £1 million is currently being run with the support of 10 well known crime writers. The campaign sees the authors compete against one another to have the morgue named after them. Members of the public can vote for their favourite author when they make a donation to the campaign. Professor Black has said that one of the unexpected outcomes of this fundraising campaign is that it has also raised public awareness regarding anatomical donation.

Clinical Anatomy Skills Centre: a state-of-the-art development

Plans to open a new state-of-the-art Clinical Anatomy Skills Centre in partnership with the University of Glasgow were formally announced in August.

This is a historic venture between the College and the University that has been made possible by the generosity of the William and Elizabeth Davies Trust, which has made a substantial contribution to its establishment.

The high-spec teaching facility is located in the Thomson building within the Anatomy Department of the University and will provide a much needed resource for existing and future medical and dental professionals to develop their skills in medicine, surgery, dentistry and a range of other allied health professions in a safe, simulated environment. It will also help to form an enhanced understanding of human anatomy.

The President described the new Centre as the beginning of an exciting new project bringing the College and the University closer together.

"In today's clinical environment it is recognised that competence, confidence and expertise in simulated skills should precede treatment on live patients," he said.

"Whereas in the past this was not available, this new Centre will fill a gap in clinical skills and anatomy teaching from the basic to the highest levels of sophistication in surgical specialties, medical specialties and dentistry."

Head of the University of Glasgow's College of Medical, Veterinary, and Life Sciences, Professor Anna Dominiczak also welcomed the development, saying, "The Clinical Anatomy Skills Centre is a vitally important innovation for postgraduate students and medical practitioners in the West of Scotland. The skills that will be developed and honed at this new collaborative venture between the




current and future health practitioners."

A multi-specialty clinical skills group is currently working hard to launch a variety of new courses to be rolled out over the next year, so watch this space. specialist training in 32 medical specialties
and subspecialties on behalf of the UK
Colleges of Physicians, who together
form the Federation of Royal Colleges
of Physicians of the UK.

The JRCPTB has several roles – producing curricula for training programmes, developing the assessment methods which measure the performance of trainees, helping implement quality assurance processes, and recommending doctors for entry on to the GMC's specialist register to enable them to practice as consultant physicians in the UK. Assistant Head of JRCPTB, Gareth Bland, provides an update of recent activity.

Workplace-based assessment pilot

Following recommendations from the GMC, the Joint Royal Colleges of Physicians' Training Board launched a major study to test a revised system of workplace-based

assessments (WPBAs) in August 2012. The pilot is taking place in three deaneries (East Midlands North, Northern and Wales) and involves trainees, trainers and programme directors in 10 specialties and will continue for 12 months.

Review of curricula

A significant proportion of medical specialty training curricula were revised in the spring of 2012. All trainees who are following the 2010 curriculum (or 2009 for GIM, AIM and CMT) will be expected to keep up to date with these changes. Information and guidance on the changes to the core medical training and general internal medicine curricula has been published on the JRCPTB website.

Graham J MacKay FRCS(Glasg)



After qualifying from Glasgow University I carried out my basic surgical training in the West of Scotland and undertook a postgraduate research degree in the area of 'enhanced recovery after surgery'. I then progressed to higher training in General Surgery. During this time I enjoyed a clinical attachment at St Mark's Hospital in London to help further develop my sub-specialty interest in colorectal surgery. Prior to taking up independent practice I carried out an Ethicon fellowship in advanced laparoscopic colorectal surgery and more recently I went, as the ASGBI Moynihan Travelling Fellow of 2010, to the Lahey Clinic in Boston and the Cleveland Clinic in Ohio. I am now working as a consultant colorectal surgeon at Glasgow Royal Infirmary with an interest in minimally invasive techniques.

During my training I was lucky enough to have a number of involvements with the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow. With support from both the Association of Surgeons in Training and the College, we set up the 'Foundation Skills in Surgery' course, which runs biannually and helps to give medical students and foundation doctors a taste of what a career in surgery has to offer. I also made small contributions to the trainees' committee, the scholarship committee and running the surgical update seminars.

In May of this year I was honoured to be offered the post of Director of Surgical Education. My role will be to help to develop surgical education delivered by the College in conjunction with the new Surgical Education, Training & Professional Development Board. I am taking up this post at a very exciting time for the College in Glasgow. Many of you will be aware of the recently announced joint venture with Glasgow University to open a Clinical

Sir William Macewen - Surgical Innovator

Many visitors to the College will have passed by the operating table of Sir William Macewen on the way to Crush Hall. The table forms a very visual reminder of Macewen's practical and innovative approach to surgery.

A graduate of the University of Glasgow, Macewen became visiting surgeon at Glasgow Royal Infirmary in 1877, moving to the Western Infirmary in 1892 on his appointment as Regius Professor of Surgery. It was, however, during his time at the Royal Infirmary that much of his pioneering work in the fields of rickets, inguinal hernia and brain surgery was undertaken.

A firm follower of Lister's work on antisepsis, Macewen experimented extensively in obtaining reliable ways of preparing and disinfecting absorbable ligatures, sutures, and drainage tubes. He continued to seek practical solutions during the First World War, devising a pelvic elevator which he used at Mount Stuart Royal Naval Hospital on the Isle of Bute.

Macewen had an ability to seek quick solutions to problems. Bowman, Macewen's biographer (London, 1942) sites an example of his acuity in this respect. When walking in the Highlands, Macewen came across a child in danger of suffocation from laryngeal diphtheria. Macewen had with him a pocket knife and a handkerchief that he could use as a sponge but had

nothing to use as retractors. He quickly utilised the mother's hairpins and, with the hairpins bent as retractors, he exposed and opened the trachea with his penknife and saved the child.

Online Resources

Bibliographic databases

Bibliographic databases provide access to large collections of resources including journal articles, books, reports and guidelines. Many of these same resources can also be found by searching the Knowledge Network website, however, by going directly to an individual database, you can carry out much more in-depth searches - This is particularly useful if you are conducting a literature search.

The advantage of using a bibliographic database is that it gives you more search options – You can limit searches (e.g. by age group, publication year, stages of care), combine searches, save searches and set up alerts.

Through your College membership, you have access to over 80 databases specialising in content for a wide variety of topics, including:

- Medical and healthcare topics Medline, Embase, OVID, Cochrane Library
- Pharmacy and Medicines Information BNF, BNF for Children, Martindale, Micromedex
- Management and Business Emerald, Health Business Elite, HMIC

Many of the databases have excellent help sections with online tutorials and tips on how to get started.

You can access all 80 databases via the Knowledge Network – you will need an Athens Account to view full-text articles. Every College member is eligible for an Athens Account.
